Amanda Garlen, LCSW, is the Behavioral Health Director at Project HOME Healthcare Services (PHHS). Amanda practices integrated behavioral healthcare utilizing the Primary Care Behavioral Health model and oversees the behavioral health providers at 3 FQHC sites. She has used her combined work history of being a researcher, wellness educator, and therapist in both outpatient mental health and outpatient drug and alcohol to incorporate best practices into the rapidly growing programs at PHHS. Amanda also uses this combined knowledge and experience in her role as the Lead Clinician for Health Federation's Philadelphia Integrated Care Network, a technical assistance and training network to promote and provide constant improvement and model fidelity for primary care behavioral health for behavioral health consultants across the Philadelphia area.

Dr. Cheryl Ho is one of the co-founders of the Valley Homeless Healthcare Program which provides patient-centered care to unhoused individuals in Santa Clara County, California, via a robust suite of delivery models that include traditional clinic settings, medical mobile units, re-entry from criminal justice settings, and street medicine. In 2010, based on their desire to more effectively address the multiplicity of needs of their patient population, her team pioneered Shared Medical Appointments for patients with opioid use disorder and demonstrated efficacy in treatment retention in this highly vulnerable population. Dr. Ho's research and clinical interests are in opioid use disorder and outcomes of individuals living in permanent supportive housing. Her current passion projects include advocating for mainstreaming addiction treatment and giving every person experiencing homelessness a place to live.

Erin Kelly uses stakeholder-driven methods to identify ways to improve systems of care for individuals with serious mental illnesses (SMI) and substance use disorders. She co-developed the Bridge peer navigator intervention to improve healthcare coordination and well-being for individuals with serious mental illnesses and is a co-founder of a practice-based research network focused on integrated care. She is currently a co-Principal Investigator with Dr. Megan Reed on a Pew-funded study to map the Philadelphia substance use treatment system for individuals with public insurance with the goal of improving treatment access and retention.

Joe Quinn, CPS (he/him), joined Pathways to Housing PA in 2017 as a Certified Peer Specialist (CPS). For four years, he worked with the agency's initial non-fidelity Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) team focused specifically on individuals with a primary diagnosis of Opioid Use Disorder (OUD). As the first organization to utilize a scattered-site Housing First model for the OUD population, Joe made significant contributions to Pathways' development of best practices for serving these individuals, leading to the development of two more OUD-focused teams in 2020 and 2021. In 2021, Joe joined the Center of Excellence at Pathways to Housing PA as a Medically Assisted Treatment (MAT) Care Manager, where he now assists participants agency-wide with accessing MAT and MOUD services. Joe also has six years of experience as a CPS at an outpatient facility.
